Costs associated with subsequent annual Plan updates for the remainder of the Contract term will be incorporated into this clause via supplemental agreement modification. Costs shall only include: the actual direct labor costs of the persons performing such services; a percentage factor of direct labor costs to cover fringe benefits and payroll taxes; travel; and other direct costs. Any fee or other indirect costs such as allocation for overhead, G&A, and Cost of Money will not be reimbursed. The Contractor shall charge to the account of the Government using the special financial institution account as provided in the Contract's Section I Clause entitled "Payments and Advances," or as otherwise directed by the Contracting Officer.

(e) Cost limitations set forth in paragraph (c) above shall not be exceeded without prior Contracting Officer approval. The Parties agree that the costs may be reviewed further for appropriateness and scope. In addition, the Parties agree that a tracking process, acceptable to the Contracting Officer, providing sufficient detail for reasonable accountability, shall be implemented.  - (2) If the Contractor's proposed plan is approved by the Contracting Officer, the Contractor may incur amounts for the approved systems and related support services and shall charge to the account of the Government using the special financial institution account as provided in the Contract's Section I Clause entitled "Payments and Advances," or as otherwise directed by the Contracting Officer. Costs shall only include: the actual direct labor costs of the persons performing such services; materials; subcontracts; travel; other direct costs; and applicable indirect costs applied in accordance with the Contractor's Parent Organization's disclosed accounting practices, or, if applicable, Cost Accounting Standards Disclosure Statement. A separate fee for use of such systems and associated services is unallowable.
 - (3) The Contractor shall provide periodic reports of activities and costs incurred as required by the Contracting Officer.

(4) Rights in software and systems. The Contractor agrees to and does hereby grant to the Government an irrevocable, nonexclusive, paid-up license by or for the Government, in any Contractor-owned software and systems brought in and used under this Clause. Said license shall be limited to the continued operations of the Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory by successor contractors.

(b) Parent Organization Experts

(1) The utilization of Parent Organization experts, which are defined herein as employees of Parent Organizations, for the purpose of achieving improvement in management and performance either to resolve deficiencies identified through Parent Organization oversight or in accordance with the Section H clause entitled "Contractor Multi-Year Strategy For Performance Improvement" are allowable costs subject to the conditions contained herein. Such Parent Organization experts' services are not considered a "Subcontract" as contemplated by the Contract's Section I Clause entitled "DEAR 970.5244-1 Contractor Purchasing System." The total estimated cost for Parent Organization experts' services is to be determined by the Contracting Officer during the Transition Period, and annually thereafter, and added via supplemental agreement contract modification.

Fiscal Year 2011 Parent Oversight Plan Lawrence Livermore National Security, LLC

I. Introduction

This Parent Oversight Plan (POP) presents for approval detailed Fiscal Year 2011 (FY11) Parent Oversight activities as required by Contract No. DE-AC52-07NA27344.

The execution of the Plan by Lawrence Livermore National Security, LLC (LLNS, LLC) and its parent companies continues the self-governance model established to monitor and continuously improve the performance of Lawrence Livermore National Laboratory (LLNL). With this plan, the parent companies of Bechtel, University of California (UC), Babcock and Wilcox Technical Services Group (B&W), URS, and Battelle will ensure the corporate support and sponsorship of the Laboratory as it endeavors to meet its mission and operational requirements. This plan is for the period from October 1, 2010 through September 30, 2011, and includes activity descriptions, cost estimates, the proposed schedule for planned activities, and reporting.

To improve integration between LLNL and Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL), the parent organizations made the decision to operate with a common Board of Governors and Committees. The Board and Committee structure allows a sharing of costs between LLNS, LLC and Los Alamos National Security, LLC (LANS, LLC) for the expenses of the Independent Governors and for Committee costs. Only the LLNS costs are reflected in this plan.

The Plan details three oversight areas, provides a cost estimate for the planned activities, and describes how these activities are reported.

II. Parent Oversight Elements

The Plan details three oversight areas:

- 1. Board of Governors and Committees
- 2. Parent Organization Functional Management Reviews
- 3. LLNS, LLC Corporate Office

Board of Governors and Committees

The Board is composed of up to sixteen members, including five independent Governors. The Board is supported by seven committees.

Board of Governors

The Board can include up to sixteen members, including the six-member Executive Committee, four Advisory Governors, a Battelle Governor, and five Independent Governors.



The Executive Committee of the Board is the decision-making body for LLNS, LLC and is responsible for the oversight of Laboratory operations. The Executive Committee members are as follows:

- Norman Pattiz Chairman (UC)
- Scott Ogilvie VIce Chairman (Bechtel)
- Bruce Darling (UC)
- William Frazer (UC)
- David Pethick (URS)
- Craig Weaver (Bechtel)

Four Advisory Member Governors are appointed by the Executive Committee. They are as follows:

- Steven Beckwith(UC)
- Tom Gioconda (Bechtel)
- Bruce Varner (UC)
- David Walker (Bechtel)

Jeffrey Wadsworth serves as the Battelle Governor.

The costs associated with these senior parent organization executives, including the Battelle Governor, will not be charged to the contract. The five Independent Governors were selected based on their experience in the most significant areas of the Laboratory. The Independent Governors will remain:

- Sid Drell
- John Gordon
- Richard Mies
- Nick Moore
- William Perry

Proposed Cost for the Independent Governors: \$231,000 (Attachment 1)

Executive Committee meetings have been held since the contract award and full Board meetings began in September 2007. Quarterly Board meetings will be held throughout FY11. Executive Committee meetings will be held, at a minimum, on a quarterly basis and more frequently if deemed necessary.

Board Committees

There are seven Board committees. These are advisory committees to the Board and each is chaired by a Board member. The cost of committee meetings is shared with LANS, LLC and the committees meet jointly. With the exception of Nominations and Compensation, which meets on an as-needed basis, the committees meet quarterly. The members of the committees appear in Attachment 2

The strategic focus of the committees was reviewed as part of a self-assessment initiated by the Board in FY 2009. Each Committee Chair was tasked with reevaluating committee membership and scope, and working with the Laboratory Director (1) to help



outline the scientific and national security vision for the Laboratory and (2) to reduce excessively burdensome administrative requirements without diminishing the effectiveness and productivity of scientific, technical, and other Laboratory employees. The results, which were reported to the full Board, have had the effect of sharpening the strategic focus of the committees.

The committees and their chairs are as follows:

Business and Operations - David Walker. This committee reviews the quality and efficacy of business and operations and identifies where best practices (commercial or throughout the DOE Complex) can improve Laboratory functions.

Ethics and Audit - Nick Moore. The committee reviews the integrity of the Laboratory's financial systems, ethics program, and other aspects of Laboratory operations, including internal controls, whistle-blower issues, and procurement.

Mission - William Perry. This committee advises on the Laboratory's capabilities and performance related to national defense and its ability to meet current and future mission needs.

Nominations and Compensation - Bruce Darling. This committee reviews and advises on selection, performance, and compensation for key and other designated personnel; benefits and compensation issues; and review of Laboratory succession planning.

Nuclear Weapons Complex Integration - Richard Mies. This committee advises on matters directly related to integrating the NNSA weapons complex, with the goal of enhancing agility, flexibility, and efficiency.

Safeguards and Security - Tom Gloconda. This committee reviews the institutionalization and implementation of appropriate and effective safeguards and security policies and procedures based on current issues and future trends.

Science and Technology - William Frazer. This committee reviews the Laboratory's scientific quality, positioning for the future national needs, and ability to attract and retain scientific staff in critical technical areas.

Proposed Cost: \$452,186 (Attachment 1)

2. Parent Organization Functional Management Reviews

Parent Organization Functional Management Reviews (FMRs) are formal, integrated reviews conducted (1) to guarantee that the Laboratory management systems are based upon the parent organizations' best practices and industry standards, and (2) to promote continuous improvement through oversight of LLNS management and systems for adequacy and effectiveness. The review teams are composed of parent organization experts from corporate staff; experts from other DOE and NNSA sites managed by Bechtel, B&W, Battelle, URS, or UC; and other subject matter experts as required. Responsibilities of corporate reach-back include verifying discipline-specific procedures and methods; providing qualified and trained resources; assessing the effectiveness of on-project implementation, guidance, and procedures; mentoring

personnel; and performing periodic peer review. Reviews in the areas of Mission and Science will evaluate the quality, responsiveness, and future positioning of programmatic and scientific work at the Laboratory.

Based on the Board's self-assessment and LLNS experience to date, sixteen Parent Organization FMRs are planned for FY 2011, as shown in Attachment 3. The areas for these reviews were selected on the basis of risk, opportunity for significant for improvement, or as peer reviews of scientific and technical work. Of the sixteen reviews, nine fall under the categories of Mission or Science and Technology (S&T). They will be conducted by specifically selected review committees, assembled for that particular review and will be drawn from the following categories:

- Program reviews organized around one of the Principal Program Directorates (emphasizing the S&T underpinnings of the programmatic work)
- Discipline reviews organized around one or more discipline directorates in the S&T Principal Directorate (emphasizing the programmatic relevance of the S&T work)
- Strategic portfolio reviews on topics of central interest to the overall mission of the laboratory.

The remaining seven FMRs will be in the Operations area. The specific topics will be identified by LLNS management, the Board of Governors and/or Committee requests, or as customer focus areas, identified trends, follow-up from previous reviews, special requests, or emergent issues. In an effort to provide lessons learned, results of similar LANS, LLC FMRs will be shared with LLNS management and the FMR teams as background information on best practices and potentially similar opportunities for improvement.

A LLNS Board of Governors Committee member will serve as the point of contact for each FMR, and many of the FMRs will be observed by a committee member to enhance the knowledge base of the committees. Reviews in the areas of Mission and Science will evaluate the quality, responsiveness, and future positioning of programmatic and scientific work at the Laboratory.

A detailed schedule will be developed, integrated, and maintained by LLNS Corporate Office staff on behalf of the Board and the parent organizations. The schedule will be based on emerging areas requiring assistance and availability of external parent team members.

Proposed Cost: \$561,250 (Attachment 1)

3. LLNS, LLC Corporate Office

The LLNS Office is responsible for ensuring that the Board of Governors' oversight activities in the Plan are implemented and that the needs of the Laboratory for corporate reach-back and external expertise are met. The LLNS Executive Office Director will be be providing support to the Board and its Committees and the implementation of the Plan on behalf of the parent organizations.



The LLNS, LLC Corporate Office will be staffed with 4.33 full-time equivalent employees during FY11. The personnel in the office provide coordination and support of the Plan, as well as technical oversight in the continuous improvement of the Laboratory.

Proposed Cost: \$1,072,295 (Attachment 1)

ill. Total Cost Estimate for Planned Activities

The cost estimate summary based on the planned activities is provided in Attachment 1. The cost estimates for each of the oversight areas will be maintained and tracked by the corporate office staff. The estimate summarizes the total cost for FY2011.

IV. Periodic Reports

The schedule of the Parent Organization FMRs will be sent to the Livermore Site Office (LSO) and to the Laboratory management on a regular basis. This schedule will detail completed and planned reviews for FY11 as they are developed and completed. In addition, a formal notice of the kick-off and exit briefings for each review, including date, time, and place, will be sent to the central point of contact for LSO. Final reports are also provided to LSO, Laboratory management, and Board Committees. The issues identified in these reports are entered and tracked via the Parent Oversight Plan Recommendations Reporting System.
